Artist in residence Krista Howell has been working with the year 12 students on their recent project 'Nature of Symbolism'. Through demonstration, guidance and showing examples of her work students were able to observe professional expertise and contemporary arts practice and they found this an enriching and invaluable experience towards their art A' level. It is exciting to see the paintings being created and they will soon be displayed in the Sixth Form Centre.

Excellent Summer Exam Results

We are immensely proud of our Year 11 and sixth-form students for their hard work, resulting in magnificent GCSE and A level results once again.

At GCSE level: 100% of our Year 11 students achieved 5 or more A* to C grades at GCSE. 99.33% achieved 5 or more A* to C grades including English and Mathematics. 23% of all grades were at A* level, with 35 students achieving 5 or more A* grades. The number of A* to B grades was 89.6%. This is higher than in the last three years.

Our English Baccalaureate figure, the new government measure that shows the percentage of students achieving A* to C in English, Mathematics, Science (dual award or two single Science subjects), a humanities subject and a MFL subject, was 89%. This is an increase from 83% last year, which placed us as the second highest in Lancashire.

At A' level: 668 A Level results were at grades A* - B, a rate of 61%. This maintains an upward trend when compared with 58.4% A* - B grades in 2010, 52.8% in 2009 and 48.8% in 2008. There was a significant increase in the number of A* grades: this year, 11.5% of grades were A*, compared to 8.5% in 2010.

Charity Fundraising


Our new Year 7 students have excelled themselves in raising £1700 for LEPRA during this term.

Geography Trip to Italy

On Wednesday 19th
October 2011, four
staff and 44 students
left for a five day
geography trip to
Sorrento.

On day one they visited Solfatara, which is a large area of volcanic activity just to the west of Naples. The crater itself is dormant but there are still lots of fumaroles and bubbling mud pits and the students got to experience for themselves minor volcanic features. Then it was on to visit Monte Nuovo - another dormant volcanic cone formed in the 1500s in one period of activity. It is now a vegetated

nature reserve with walking trails.

Day two provided a visit to the island of Capri, a beautiful island famed for its glamorous shops and houses, and took the chairlift to the summit of Monte Solaro followed by tenpin bowling in Sorrento.

Day three consisted of a guided tour to the rim of Vesuvius and a visit to Pompeii, a UN world heritage site of an almost perfectly preserved Roman town totally overwhelmed by the AD 79 eruption. The evening was taken up by a stroll into Sorrento to see a Tarantella show.

The final day was spent on a coast drive to Amalfi and a visit to the ruins at Paestum.

Debating Matters

Following the revival of the BRGS debating society last year, this year has seen the students try to emulate and build on the successes of the school's past debating prowess.

The society entered three teams into this year's

Cambridge Union Schools' Debating Competition first round, hosted here at BRGS.

On 19th October, 11 EPQ (Extended Project Qualification) students gave presentations of their projects to an audience including other students, their supervisors, other staff and four invited guests including three governors and one retired member of staff.

Students spent one hour discussing their work with individuals, explaining their findings and answering questions stimulated by posters that the students had prepared. Following a short break, each student gave a short individual oral presentation followed by further questions from the audience. The range of topics was vast, including subjects such as quantum immortality, identifying appropriate supplements for rugby players, the autobiographical nature of *War and Peace* and factors influencing development of the pyramids.

The students' knowledge of their topics was impressive as was their overall ability to respond well to challenging questions from the audience. The visiting governors and staff all commented on how they had enjoyed the afternoon. A further group of students will be presenting their projects in a similar manner next February.



Obituaries

We are saddened to learn of the following:

Harry Wakelin, former pupil from 1931 until 1935, sadly died on 8th April 2011 aged 90 years. Harry, formerly of Schofield Road, Rawtenstall, lived with his family in Northern Ireland for the last 56 years.

We are sorry to hear of the death of **Neil Taylor**, a pupil of the school from 1942 until 1948, and also **Marion Padget (née Lord)** former student who left in 1954.

Peter Auty sadly died on 15th February 2011 aged 77 years. Peter was a student here from 1944 until 1951, and after completing National Service, he went on to Alsager College where he studied PE with Mathematics. He taught at Whitewell Bottom School for three years before going back to Alsager for another year to complete Advanced Mathematics. Peter then moved to Lichfield. Staffordshire, to take up the post of Head of Mathematics at King Edward VI School. He later became Head of Lower School. He was always interested in sport and played football and competed in athletics during his time at BRGS. He leaves his wife Carol, three daughters, one stepson and nine grandchildren. His wife Carol wrote that he had happy memories of BRGS and often told her of 'Ma Mac', who passed away a month after Peter.

Harry Gibson, former Deputy Headmaster from 1973-1988, sadly died on 25th October 2011. Harry retired from school in 1988 following 14 years as deputy headteacher and a short spell as acting head. He then volunteered for over two decades as a booking clerk on the East Lancashire Railway, based at Bury Station, where he worked until his final year. Born in Adlington, Harry was educated at Bolton School and St John's College, Oxford, where he read modern languages. A keen sportsman, he served on the organising committee for the Northern Schools' Cross Country Championships. In later years, he loved to go walking on the hills of Rossendale and Holcombe, where he lived with his family for more

than 40 years. When Harry joined BRGS, he was appointed to take pastoral charge over four school years, and was an active member of the PTA and served as chairman for a period. One of his most important contributions to the school was in his role as chairman of an action group established in 1982 to fight local education reorganisation plans. In a joint tribute penned upon his retirement, former BRGS colleagues Fred Wild and Dorothy Skeels said 'His tremendous efforts in this respect probably went unnoticed by all except those who worked closely with him, but the survival of the school to this day owes much to his guidance at that time. In every way he showed himself to have a deep love of teaching and a concern for those he taught.'

Peter Benson Lonsdale sadly died in June 2011 aged 72 years. After leaving BRGS in 1956, Peter read Municipal Engineering at what is now UMIST, graduating in 1959. In that year he began work for the City of Birmingham Water Department, first in Ludlow and then in Birmingham. Ludlow had given him a taste for working in a rural environment so in January 1963, he moved to Newtown, Montgomeryshire as Senior Assistant Engineer to the Montgomeryshire Water Board. He married in February 1965 and in July of that year moved to Norfolk where he worked for East Suffolk and Norfolk Rivers Authority mainly on flood defence schemes. During this time, he completed the requirements to become a member of the Institution of Civil Engineers and also the Institution of Water Engineers. In 1977, he moved to Dorset and in his final years became a senior international consultant for Wessex Water which involved working in a variety of countries including Saudi Arabia, Cyprus, Malta, Vietnam, and Australia, with a year working in St Lucia. Peter retired in 1994, but undertook private consultancy work and published a book with Dr D Obradavic titled Public Water Supply, Models, Data and Operational Management.

Kenneth Jones who was a pupil here from 1938 until 1943 sadly died on 31st October 2011, at the age of 84 years. Ken was a founder member and the first treasurer of the PTA from 1970 until 1977 when the last of his three children left BRGS.
